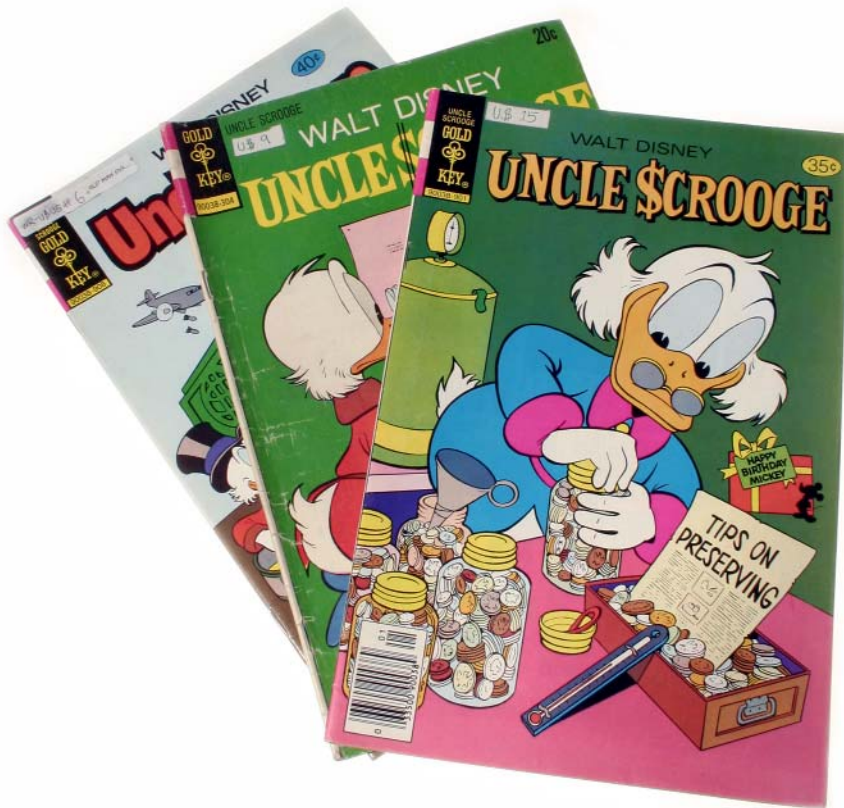

BOTTOM: The danish **pan/scan** version.

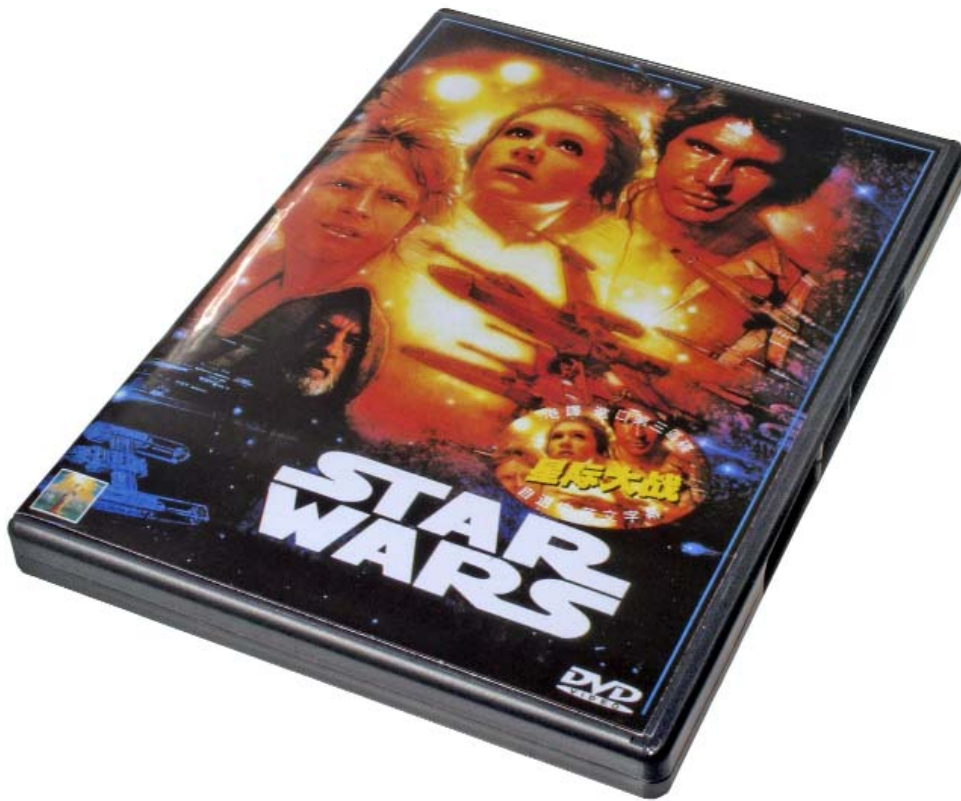
Please notice that the picture is also squeezed. Everything appear slightly taller. This deformation is done to fit more picture into the frame.
